MATHEMATICS-II

DETERMINANTS & MATRICES:

Determinants: Definition & expansion of determinants of order 2 and 3. Properties of determinants (statement only). Minors and cofactors. Evaluation of determinants of order 4 by Chio's method.

Matrix Algebra: Definition of a matrix of order $m \times n$, leading element, principal diagonal. Types of matrices – null matrix, square matrix, diagonal matrix, identity matrix etc. Symmetric and Skew symmetric matrices. Matrix algebra – addition, subtraction, scalar multiplication and multiplication of matrices. Matrix inversion by adjoint method.

NUMERICAL METHODS:

Concept of Interpolation with Newton forward interpolation formula (Statement only). Simple Problems. Numerical solution of simultaneous linear equations by Gaussian elimination method only (without proof). Numerical Solutions of non-linear equations by Newton-Raphson method (without proof). Numerical integration by trapezoidal rule & Simpson's 1/3 rule (without proof).

INTEGRATION:

Definition of Integration as inverse process of differentiation. Integration of standard functions. Rules for integration (sum, difference, scalar multiple).

Methods for Integration: Integration by substitution. Integration by trigonometric substitution. Integration by parts. Integration by partial fraction.

Definite Integral: Definition of Definite Integral. Properties of definite integrals with simple problems.

Applications of Definite Integral: Area under plain curves. Area bounded by two curves. Volume of revolution. Simple examples.

ORDINARY DIFFERENTIAL EQUATIONS:

Definition of ordinary differential equation, order & degree. Solution of differential equations of 1st order & 1st degree of variable separable type Homogeneous type Reducible to homogeneous type exact type linear type. Reducible to linear type (Bernoulli's Equation).



Solution of 2nd order linear ordinary differential equations with constant coefficients:

Evaluation of Complementary functions (C.F.). Evaluation of Particular Integral (P.I.) for exponential function, polynomial function, sine and cosine function & functions of the form $e^{ax}V$ where V is any one of the above.

PARTIAL DIFFERENTIATION:

Definition & meaning of partial derivative. Evaluation of partial derivatives. Definition & examples of homogeneous functions. Euler's theorem (1st order) on Homogeneous functions for 2 & 3 variables (without proof). Simple problems.

STATISTICS & PROBABILITY:

Statistics: Definition & examples of frequency distribution. Measures of central tendency (mean, median, mode) for ungrouped and grouped frequency distribution. Measures of dispersion – Standard deviation, Simple problems.

Probability: Definition of random experiment, sample space, event, occurrence of events & types of events (e.g. Impossible, mutually exclusive, exhaustive, equally likely). Classical & axiomatic definition of probability. Addition & multiplication theorems of probability (statement only). Simple problems.

Unit I - Stress and strain: Concept of stress and strain. Various types of stress and Strains, Definition of tension, compression, shear, bending, torsion, concept of volumetric and lateral strain, Poisson's ratio, changes in dimensions and volume of a bar under direct load (Axial and along all the three Axes), ultimate stress, Working stress, elasticity, Hook's Law, Load deformation diagram for mild steel and cast iron. Definition of modulus of elasticity, Yield point, modulus of rigidity and bulk modulus, stress & strain for homogeneous material and composite section.

Unit II

Kinematics of Particles: Differential equations of kinematics – plane, rectilinear and curvilinear motions; Cartesian co-ordinate system; Normal and tangent co-ordinate system, projectile motion.

Kinetics of Particles: Newton's second law of motion; Work and energy principle – gravitational potential energy, elastic potential energy, kinetic energy, power, efficiency; Principle of impulse and momentum; Impact motion- direct central impact.

Rotation of Rigid Bodies: Kinematics of rotation; Kinetics of rotation- equation of motion, principle of work and energy; Principle of impulse and momentum'

Plane Motion of Rigid Bodies Translation of a rigid body in a plane; Kinematics of plane motion; Instantaneous centre of rotation; Kinetics of plane motion – equation of motion, principle of work and energy; Principle of impulse and momentum.

Unit III - Project work

A project work will be assigned to the students by the concerned subject faculty. It will carry 10 marks and will be evaluated by the faculty itself. The topic of the project will be decided by the faculty. The students will work in a group of 3 – 5 on each topic. The topic should be related to the subject taught by the faculty and should have proper utility and importance to enhance his practical skill & knowledge.

INTRODUCTION TO ELECTRICAL & ELECTRONICS TECHNOLOGY

Credit: 4

DC Network Theorem: Definition of electric circuit, network, linear circuit, non-linear circuit, bilateral circuit, unilateral circuit, Dependent source, Kirchoff's law, Principle of superposition. Source equivalence and conversion, Thevenin's theorem, Norton Theorem, nodal analysis, mesh analysis, star-delta conversion. Maximum power transfer theorem with proof.

Electromagnetism: Biot-savart law, Ampere's circuital law, field calculation using Biot-savart & ampere's circuital law. Magnetic circuits, Analogous quantities in magnetic and electric circuits, Faraday's law, Self and mutual inductance. Energy stored in a magnetic field, B-H curve, Hysteretic and Eddy current losses, Lifting power of Electromagnet.

AC fundamental: Production of alternating voltage, waveforms, average and RMS values, peak factor, form factor, phase and phase difference, phasor representation of alternating quantities, phasor diagram, behavior of AC series, parallel and series parallel circuits, Power factor, Power in AC circuit, Effect of frequency variation in RLC series and parallel circuits, Resonance in RLC series and parallel circuit, Q factor, band width of resonant circuit.

Semiconductors:

Crystalline material: Mechanical properties, Energy band theory, Fermi levels; Conductors, Semiconductors and Insulators: electrical properties, band diagrams. Semiconductors: intrinsic and extrinsic, energy band diagram, electrical conduction phenomenon, P-type and N-type semiconductors, drift and diffusion carriers.

Diodes and Diode Circuits:

Formation of P-N junction, energy band diagram, and built-in-potential forward and reverse biased P-N junction, formation of depletion zone, V-I characteristics, Zener breakdown,



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Avalanche breakdown and its reverse characteristics; Junction capacitance and Varactor diode. Simple diode circuits, load line, linear piecewise model;

Rectifier circuits: half wave, full wave, PIV, DC voltage and current, ripple factor, efficiency, idea of regulation.

Bipolar Junction Transistors:

Formation of PNP / NPN junctions, energy band diagram; transistor mechanism and principle of transistors, CE, CB, CC configuration, transistor characteristics: cut-off active and saturation mode, transistor action, injection efficiency, base transport factor and current amplification factors for CB and CE modes. Biasing and Bias stability: calculation of stability factor.

Course Contents

1. Basic Computer Concepts – Different generations of computer hardware; Number System, Logic Gates, Modern taxonomy of computers; Hardware and software; Basic computer applications; General idea of information technologies; Information system development process.

2. Number System- Different Number Systems: Decimal, Binary, Octal, Hexadecimal. Conversions from one number system to other. Logic Gates- Overview of logic gate; Basic Gates (AND, OR, NOT) with truth table and diagram; Universal Gate (NAND, NOR, XOR) with truth table and diagram; Designing Boolean algebraic expression with logic gates

3. Computer Hardware – Input and Output devices; Memory (or storage) devices; Central Processing Unit. Input / Output devices: keyboard, mouse, light pen, barcode readers, scanners, MICR, OCR, voice recognition and handwriting recognition systems; visual display terminals, printers, plotters etc. Storage devices: Primary storage – RAM, ROM, EEROM, PROM, EPROM; Secondary storage – direct access devices, serial access devices: hard disks, floppy disks, magnetic tape, CD-ROM, DVD; Cache memory and Virtual memory. Central Processing Unit – Control Unit; Arithmetic and Logic Unit; and shift registers.



- 4.** Computer Software – Meaning of software; broad classification of software; system software and application software; utilities. Systems software – Operating systems: Basic idea of an OS; OS as a resource manager – memory management, input/output management, secondary storage management, processor management, program management, network management; Brief introduction to different types of operating systems like DOS, Windows, Unix, Linux etc. Application software – System development tools, Utilities, Application packages.
- 5.** Programming languages and Algorithms – The concept of programming; pseudo code and flowcharts; structure of programs; program development guidelines; programming languages – machine language, assembly languages, high-level languages (procedural and object-oriented languages), fourth generation languages; object code and executable codes; compilers, translators, assemblers; editing tools such as vi. Algorithms – Basic concept; some typical algorithms – Finding the sum of a series, solving a quadratic equation, generating Fibonacci sequence, checking whether a number is prime or not, creating an array of numbers and displaying the largest element in the list, sorting a given set of numbers, multiplying together two matrices etc. (The algorithms may be implemented using pseudo code).
- 6.** Computer networks and Internet – Basic concepts of computer networks; local area networks and wide area networks; switches, hubs, routers, idea of distributed systems; the Internet and the World Wide Web.
- 7.** Computer Applications: Essential features of computer systems and structures required for office automation, networking, and parallel processing.
